Key achievements to date 2019-20

- Provision is of a high standard and is accessed with enthusiasm by the great majority of children. Individual exercise equipment now offers a different possibility for engaging children in personal challenge activity.
- Of those children in KS2 who were deemed 'harder to reach', the vast majority have participated in at least one event or competition outside of curricular PE: For some children this has been a turning point in their enthusiasm for participation.
- The great majority of children are able to explain what is meant by healthy living and to speak with knowledge about the links between exercise, rest and nutrition.
- Competition is an integral part of our sport offer and children have enjoyed their achievements. A large percentage of children have had the opportunity to represent the school in competition.
- For some children, additional opportunities to learn outside of the classroom, using physical skills and activities to engage, for example, in gardening, has provided positive motivation and purpose and enabled them to learn in a new context.
- During partial school closure, we were able to continue to offer highquality PE provision for the children of critical workers and vulnerable children.

Areas for focus 2020-21

- Due to Covid19 safety measures Ensure all children are able to enjoy a full, active lunchtime break, despite operating in 'bubble groups' with staggered timings.
- 2. Following partial school closure and the subsequent return of children - Support the physical, emotional and mental health of children through: physical activity; exercise; activities that enable relaxation and opportunities to explore our physical and mental well-being.
- 3. To support a reintroduction to the enjoyment of physical activity particularly those whose activity was restricted during school closure – Targeted extra-curricular provision.
- Extend the use of our grounds for 'outdoor learning' Linked to point 2 above. Making provision for physical activity; problem-solving; teambuilding; improved mental health.
- Provide changing facilities at school that meet the needs of children in terms of privacy and dignity – Targeted particularly at upper Key Stage Two
- 6. Continue to develop the range and depth of staff skills in PE and Sport, including in subject leadership. We will provide training in order that every classroom has a member of staff with the skills and confidence to plan, deliver and assess PE
