PARKING ON HENRY PRESTON ROAD AND RICHES CLOSE

Local residents, have once again, raised concerns about dangerous and inconsiderate parking of vehicles visiting the school premises, particularly at drop off and collection times. This week, Mr Walker and Mrs Perry-Yates, our Chair of Governors, met with members of the Parish Council to discuss ways to improve the situation.

If it is necessary for you to drive your child to/from school, then please note the following points:

- Please park safely and legally without causing obstruction to driveways of neighbouring properties. The Highway Code states that you must not park opposite or within 10 metres of a junction. This is to allow drivers emerging from, or turning into, the junction a clear view of the road they are joining. It also allows them to see hazards such as pedestrians or cyclists at the junction.
- The Highway Code states that you must not park on a kerb, as this poses a risk to pedestrians as well as obstructing the pavement.
- The Highway Code states that if a parked car is blocking your side of the road, then you should give way to oncoming traffic.
- Although the speed limit is 30mph, it is clearly unsafe for vehicles to drive at this speed
 within a residential cul-de-sac, particularly at school drop off times, when there will
 inevitably increases in pedestrian and vehicular traffic. Please drive slowly and with
 caution.

Thank you for your ongoing support with this matter. I am certain that we can work together with local residents and Norfolk Police to ensure the safety of our children as they travel to and from school.

performing a song in our music lesson.


Grasshoppers: **Flynn** for working hard to complete fieldwork around Tasburgh and for completing good artwork at the church.

fieldwork.








In Dragonfly Class - we have been thinking about the question:
